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# Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2016

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The objects and activities of the charity identified in the trust deed are:

(a) "awakening the public interest in and appreciation of Britain's architectural heritage

(b) to encourage the study of that heritage and related matters and to promote high standards of planning and architecture (c) to save from needless destruction or disfigurement buildings or groups of building and designed landscapes of special historic or architectural interest"

The trust deed identifies the following means

(a) "the printing publication and distribution by sale or otherwise of books pamphlets papers and pictorial or other matter
(b) the provision promotion and organisation of lectures educational courses public and private meetings exhibitions and other forms of instruction and publicity

(c) the making of gifts or donation to charitable bodies where in the opinion of the Trustees such gifts or donations will be conducive to the promotion of the objects of the Trust

(d) the bringing to public notice of threats to historic buildings and townscape and designed landscape"

Through these the charity aims to prevent the unnecessary loss of precious historic buildings, a resource historic, environmental, cultural, social and financial that once lost cannot be replaced.

#### Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

2016 was a fantastically busy year for SAVE. By way of a summary of our major cases through the year, we won the battle to save the Welsh Streets and secured a permanent reprieve of demolition for some 400 terraced houses. Plans were also announced for refurbishment and adaptation proposals for the streets by a developer. A pilot scheme was launched and we followed the project closely.

We had major legal and high profile challenges over the Futurist cinema and Lime Street in Liverpool, and a Victorian street and surrounding buildings in Grimsby Docks - supported and advised by our superb legal team. Both cases garnered considerable public support and helped focus national and international attention on unnecessary and harmful heritage destruction.

In London, the Museum of London appointed their architectural team for the transformation of the Smithfield General Market - a major SAVE case in 2014 and we were in contact with the museum as their plans for the buildings develop.

We petitioned the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government to call in the so called 'Paddington Cube' proposals - a 19 storey office tower in a Conservation Area, next to the Grade I listed Paddington Station. This followed Westminster City Council's controversial decision to grant planning permission for the development in December.

Also in London, we welcomed Tracey Emin's withdrawal of plans to demolish and replace a landmark building in Spitalfields - on a prominent corner of a conservation area. SAVE, supported by the Spitalfields Trust, the Twentieth Century Society and others, was preparing to take part in the inquiry, but in December Tracy Emin withdrew the appeal.

We continued to be involved with detailed negotiations over the acquisition and restoration plans for Wentworth Woodhouse in Yorkshire by the specially formed Trust. This was given a major boost by the Chancellor's offer of a start up grant of £7.6m for the rescue, announced in the autumn statement.

We were pleased that the damaging plans for the redevelopment of Winchester town centre were abandoned following decisive action from the Council and a local campaign with strong support from SAVE.

In 2016 we welcomed our new director Henrietta Billings. We hosted two book launches - our annual Buildings at Risk Catalogue and the 'Big Saves'. Our first Saviour event took place in Spitalfields.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

## Reserves policy

The Trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately three months of unrestricted charitable expenditure. The Trustees consider that this level will provide sufficient funds to continue with its charitable activities. The balance held as unrestricted funds in assets freely available at the year end was in excess of this.

Results are shown in the attached financial statements. Membership subscriptions and book sales continue to be a regular income and member support remains fundamental to the organisation.

## Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2016

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

The charity is an unincorporated trust, constituted under a trust deed dated 6th June 1975.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees are elected by the board of trustees. Trustees serve for three years after which they may put themselves forward for re-election. The vice-chairman/men are elected for five years and the Chairman for seven. New trustees may be sought by open advertisement or through prior involvement with the charity and the Board of Trustees.

Newly appointed trustees meet with the Executive President and Director for an update on the charity's activities, procedures and financial position, and are given copies of the minutes of recent board and advisory committee meetings and recent annual reports and accounts.

#### **Organisational structure**

At biannual trustees meetings, the trustees agree the broad strategy of the charity in relation to campaigns for historic buildings and areas and on issues affecting the historic built environment, as well as employment and investment. The day to day running of the charity is delegated to the Secretary, and the Secretary and Executive President have, through the trust deed, broad authority to act in pursuit of the charity's aims between trustee meetings without recourse to the trustees.

The Director and Executive President are advised by an expert committee which meets every two months to discuss cases and issues and offer detailed advice on campaigns. This contains four trustees and twelve other members at present.

#### Related parties and connected charities

The charity has two charities to which it is connected by virtue of a unity of administration as well as related objects. These charities are The SAVE Trust (charity number 1069501) and SAVE Europe's Heritage (charity number 1042202). Marcus Binney is a trustee of both The SAVE Trust and SAVE Europe's Heritage and John Harris is a trustee of SAVE Europe's Heritage.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2016

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

These accounts are the first set to be prepared by the company under FRS 102. On transition a review has been carried out of the previously recognised amounts to identify any that would need to be restated under the new standards, but no adjustments were required.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

#### Stocks

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Investments are revalued each year.

Following a successful public inquiry led by SAVE, the demolition plans were abandoned in January 2016. Throughout the year we have had continued to have a 'guardian' living in the house. Meanwhile discussions having been taking place between a developer and Liverpool City Council regarding major refurbishment and adaptation works to all of the houses in the Welsh Streets. As these plans develop, and the fortune of the surrounding streets are changing, we are assessing our medium and long term options for the house.

#### Purpose of restricted funds:

Winstanley Hall - Funding towards professional fees spent on Winstanley Hall.

Internships - Legacy left to cover the costs of employing interns for a period of 3 to 12 months.

Smithfield - To fund the campaign to save Smithfield General Market from demolition or partial demolition

Piercefield - To fund the campaign to save Piercefield House from further dereliction, repair it and bring it into new use

Wentworth Woodhouse - To fund the campaign of securing the house for the nation

London Publication - To fund the publication of a report on threats to the architectural heritage of London Develop corporate fundraising - from Heritage Lottery Fund for improving website and database, staff training and mentoring.

Fundraising salaries - to fund costs of a fund-raising officer.

Welsh Streets - to fund legal action to secure a reprieve for 440 terrace houses in the Welsh Streets, Liverpool.

Winchester - Throughout 2015 SAVE provided support to a local led campaign against proposals for the Silver Hill area of Winchester, adjacent to the Cathedral. A judicial review initiated by a local councillor against the proposals was successful, and the plans were refused. SAVE worked with local architect Huw Thomas to prepare initial concepts for an alternative scheme for the site.

Lime Street, Liverpool - SAVE objected to proposals to demolish more than ten eighteenth, nineteenth, and twentieth century buildings on Liverpool Lime Street, including the 1912 Futurist Cinema, for replacement with an 11 storey student accommodation tower. The site is within the World Heritage Site Buffer Zone, and within the setting of many listed buildings and a Conservation Area. When the plans were approved by the council, SAVE began judicial review proceedings, which were heard in December. Although the case was dismissed by the court, an appeal was sought, and the case continued throughout 2016.

Fighting Fund - The Fighting Fund supported SAVE's campaigns in the Strand, London, and Lime Street, Liverpool in 2015, contributing towards the costs of legal advice and challenges.

The Strand - In 2015 SAVE led the campaign to save five eighteenth and nineteenth century townhouses next to Somerset House from demolition. The campaign attracted significant press attention - print, radio, and Television - and campaigning resulted in the planning application being withdrawn. SAVE then worked with architects Burrell Foley Fischer to develop an alternative proposal for the buildings, showing how they could be reused.

Historic Schools - SBH received funding to prepare a report on historic and architecturally significant schools, looking in detail at the issues and challenges surrounding this type of historic building today.

Grimsby - Campaign against the demolition of historic buildings which formed part of the Grimsby Dockyard.
